



Hazard Information for teachers

Glasgow Cathedral

Glasgow Cathedral is situated at the east end of Cathedral Street in Glasgow. The cathedral was built during the 13th to 15th centuries and is one of the few Scottish churches to have survived the Reformation almost complete. Please note it is still a working church.

It is the responsibility of teachers and group leaders to complete a risk assessment prior to any site visit with a group. This is a requirement of most education authorities. The following information is intended as a preparatory tool and does not replace a teacher's or group leader's own risk assessment.

Please be aware that changes in weather may affect the risks inherent in an outdoor site. Pupils should dress for outdoors.

Potential hazards at Glasgow Cathedral

Pedestrian access to site

- Risk from other traffic when moving from car park behind Provands Lordship on McLeod St.

External Hazards

- Tomb stones around cathedral can become slippery when wet.

Internal Hazards

- Steep stairs with handrails.
- Some flag stones uneven underfoot – trip risk.
